What a fantastic start McAuley High School has had this year. Thank you students, parents and whanau - attendance is around 95% each day, only a handful of girls are late, classes are settled and students are focused. It feels great!

Thank you for supporting our change to beginning the day with period 1 and learning time. The huge majority of students are at school on time and ready to learn. When a student is late it affects her, it disrupts her classmates and disrupts her teachers. When we really value the gift of learning, we ensure we are on time every day.

We welcome seven new teachers this year. In the English Department is Mr Albert Fihaki, who has come from Wesley College, and Ms Nicole Naucabalavu, who is beginning her teaching career. Our new Drama teacher is Ms Seluvaia 'Iloahefaiva who comes to us from Rosehill College. Mr Cory Melville is on his OE from England and is in the Physical Education Department for this year. The Mathematics Department has welcomed three fantastic new staff, Ms Myra Faamausili, who is a past Head Girl of McAuley, Mr Seonho Hwangbo from Otahuhu College, and Ms Shereen Arsecularatne, who is well known to students as one of our relievers for a number of years. Mrs Cara Maria joins the Health and Guidance Department part time as a Counsellor. Finally, Mrs Ashika Rashid is our new Laboratory Technician and joins the team in the Science Department.

Our Academic results are similar to 2023. Level 1 pass rate was 92%, Level 2 was 89%, Level 3 75% and UE 46%. Last year 58% of our Year 12 students gained an endorsement at Level 1 and 46% of our Year 13 students gained an endorsement at Level 2. Congratulations to all our students who have worked hard and gained the rewards.

The start of the school year is always a busy time for us. We began in mid-January with our Prefect camp, where 22 amazing students developed their leadership skills and bonded together to form a strong team. They are well planned and organised already! Our Teacher-only-day was spent at St Vinnies Centre in Onehunga helping pack food parcels and prepare food as we gave life to our school value of the year - Aroha. Year 9 orientation was held over three days as we welcomed 168 students from 32 schools.

Mass at the Cathedral opened the year and it was lovely to have the whole school make the effort to be here on the first day. We have dedicated our Prefects in a beautiful ceremony with their parents. Year level Talanoa for parents are being advertised and Meet-the-teacher is scheduled for Wednesday 28 February. This is a fantastic informal way to meet the teachers entrusted with your daughter's care and education this year, and we look forward to seeing you.

This year the sole focus for staff professional development is literacy and numeracy. Staff are upskilling in being able to meet and accelerate the needs of our students. I thank staff for their weekly commitment to this important aspect of education.

Enrolments for 2025 are open, and for non-preference students (students with no link to the Catholic church), enrolments close at the end of Term 1. Enrolment for all other students closes at the end of Term 3, or when we are full. Once we are full then we have to close the roll. This year we have turned away at least 50 families who were too late with their completed enrolment documents. Please don't let this be your family, pick up an enrolment pack now, get your preference form signed by a priest and get it back in quickly.

Finally, Easter is early this year so we are already in Lent.

The theme for 2024 is The Time is Now! Ko Tēnei tonu te Wā!

The obvious question that follows this call for action is *Time for what?* And so over the six weeks of Lent parishes and prayer groups and families at home will focus on


